Discussions with Dave

I remember when I got my first computer my first year at seminary. It was a Tandy unit from Radio Shack that cost nearly \$1,800. It used 5 ¼ floppy disks. You put a disk in to get a program going, like WordPerfect. Then you put in another disk to store what you wanted to write and save. My Credo, my 46-page paper on what "I Believe," took two floppy disks. They only stored about 256,000 bits of information. This was long before the World Wide Web.

After we moved to our first parish, I bought a 386 based machine, complete with 1 megabyte of RAM and a 40-megabyte hard drive. I updated this machine a couple of times before building a new one during the Packers victory in Super Bowl XXXI of 1997. This was the first machine I put a dial up modem into so I could join those surfing the web. Not everyone was doing that in those days. I did not have a phone in my pocket at that time. My first cell phone was a year away yet.

Now it sometimes appears being connected is seen as a birthright. We can find information in a flash with our smartphones. It is both a great blessing and a great curse. While we can be connected all the time, there do not seem to be many times of disconnect. I remember Brother Burke Johnson, then President of the Western District, saying he enjoyed not having a cell phone because driving in his car was one of the few places he didn't have to worry about getting a call or dealing with an issue.

Take away my ability to connect today...and I feel like someone asked me to lose a limb.

I suppose like most people who bought a PC (unlike those Apple users who were smarter than I), I started out my days on the internet using Windows Explorer, or something equivalent to it in the late 90's. Other online programs came and went, but Microsoft continued to be the program of choice for me. Until recently. More and more I find myself using Google Chrome. So, I have transferred from one monopolistic company to another, I guess.

All programs have their good and bad sides, but recently I have been bombarded with more and more advertisements popping up on the lower right side of my screen. Some tell me how bad some medication is for you. Some direct me to click to find a good refinancing rate for my home (Actually, I kind of like that one. I wonder how much I could get for a home I don't own?) They are irritating because I must stop what I am doing to click them off. Sometimes they mess me up. What normally would be the button to close it now opens a new page instead. I find it frustrating when I am in the middle of doing something important like writing a sermon. It ends up making my sermon longer....

I realize people are trying to get their advertising out there for all to see. It is one way we find out about products and services. In the days of "free" television, it was the way it was kept free. In order to get something, you must put up with something. I received a call from a company informing me I had won a week's vacation at a resort. All I had to do was listen to a someone talk about Timeshares for 8 hours.

I remembered an old saying, "Nothing in life is free."

It is amazing what we will put up with to get something for free. But it is true, everything has a price. Maybe we didn't pay for it, but someone did. Somewhere along the line it got paid for.

You and I have received a free gift from God, salvation. Merriam-Webster's Dictionary defines salvation:

- 1 a: deliverance from the power and effects of sin
b: the agent or means that effects salvation;
- 2: liberation from ignorance or illusion;
- 3 a: preservation from destruction or failure
b: deliverance from danger or difficulty.

But this gift was not totally free. Romans 5:15: But the free gift is not like the trespass. For if the many died through the one man's trespass, much more surely have the grace of God and the free gift in the grace of the one man, Jesus Christ, abounded for the many.

Christ endured pain and death. It was the payment for us. Nothing in life is totally free.

Jerry Jenkins awarded the James V. Salzwedel Award

From the Moravian Music Foundation's Website:



"The James V. Salzwedel Award for Excellence in Church Music (established April 2004) focuses on Moravian music at the most immediate level: that of the music life of the congregation. Over the years, many musicians have given excellent and long-lasting service to music and worship in Moravian congregations. Recognition for these individuals affirms the vital importance of music in Moravian worship; the vital role played by accomplished musicians in leading the music programs in the congregations, in encouraging and supporting congregational song, in the development of musical skills for all members of a congregation, and in guiding young people in their musical and spiritual growth. While very few Moravian congregations have a staff member identified as "Minister of Music," Moravian worship practice for many centuries has included music as an integral part of worship, and thus the musical leaders of a congregation have a vital ministry in partnership with the ordained clergy. Recipients of the James V. Salzwedel Award will show significant contributions to the musical life of the congregation(s) they have served, over an extended period of time. While most will hold positions such as choir director, organist, or band director within a congregation (or be retired from such a position), it is possible that a volunteer member of a congregation's music program may have made such a significant contribution to that congregation's musical life that the award is clearly merited."

Our Senior Choir Director of 55 years, Jerry Jenkins, was nominated for this award. Although not a member of the Moravian Church, Jerry contributed greatly to the music ministry of this congregation through his work with the choir. He will be presented with this award during the morning worship service on Sunday, October 6. Please join us as we celebrate this wonderful occasion.

Working Through the Change

The sermon message, Credos and Chaos, given at the services on August 18 and 19, addressed how change can create chaos in our lives. God, the Father and Creator of heaven and earth, brought order to the chaos out of nothingness. On the first day of creation, God established the cycle of night and day. Pastor Dave also shared that we are now in a state of change with the retirement of Jerry Jenkins. Jerry served as the choir director for over fifty years. His retirement leaves a void in our Music Ministry. During this time of change there is a sense of chaos as we look forward to the future. The work of shaping the next steps is under the guidance of the Worship and Music Committee as they evaluate, research and envision the possibilities for the future of the Music Ministry with congregational input.

Meanwhile.....during this period of transition, the W & M Committee has assigned the responsibility of developing small ensembles (vocal, instrumental, and combinations) to Rich Fronck and Cora Rund. In the remainder of this article, we are going to share the plans for the beginning of a Tenor and Bass (T & B) ensemble.

We are seeking a nucleus of four to six tenors and basses to provide the foundation of this ensemble. This core nucleus of voices will prepare and sing special music, introduce new hymns, as well as sing special verses of hymns with the congregation at services. At this time, a total of four tenors/basses have volunteered to serve in the core nucleus. Two more voices would provide extra reinforcement and coverage in case of illness or absence. Tentatively, we are planning to have the core nucleus provide special music in October, December, February, and April. Additional times will be identified based upon the availability of the members of the ensemble.



In addition to the core nucleus, we are seeking seasonal tenors and basses to provide additional reinforcement to the core group. The seasonal singers can select one or more seasons of singing that fits within their schedule. The seasons include:

- September – November (*Fall, All Saints, and Thanksgiving*)
- December – February (*Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany*)
- March – May (*Lent, Easter, Pentecost*)

We are still in the formation stage. The rehearsal schedule will be developed with member input. Watch the bulletin announcements for the first meeting date and time. How can you support the Music Ministry at Lake Mills Moravian Church?

1. Keep the work of the Worship and Music Committee in your prayers.
2. Give thanks for the musicians and committee members who currently serve in the Music Ministry.
3. Consider singing with the core nucleus for at least one season.
4. Encourage others to join in our work.
