Discussions with Dave

Recently I found out I may be related to a John Billington. Mr. Billington came from England to America with his family on the Mayflower and was a part of the Plymouth Colony. While that sounds great, apparently the Billington family were trouble makers in the colony. John himself became the first known murderer in the colonies and is somewhat famous for being the first person executed in what is now the United States in 1630.

At first, I was excited about possibly being related to one of the pioneers of our nation. As I read it became somewhat sobering.

On September 13-16, I spent almost four days in Montgomery, Alabama, at a Racial Justice Pilgrimage with many of my colleagues from across the Moravian Church. I looked forward to learning some history, but it also was somewhat sobering.

Brother Frank Crouch, retired Dean of Moravian Seminary, has been doing a great deal of research in the Southern Province. He relayed to the group gathered that brothers and sisters of our Moravian Church owned slaves. Much of the wealth of our early nation was gained through the tobacco, cotton, and fruit trades, all of which utilized slave labor. An estimated 6-7 million individuals were kidnapped from their own lands and forcibly brought to the New World. It is estimated 2 million did not survive the journey. And while the slave trade was outlawed in 1808, those already enslaved in these United States were not freed until the Confederate States of America were defeated in 1865. It was then the true horror began.

With no one willing to enforce civil rights laws in most areas of the U.S., terror was used to keep former slaves under control. The rise of the Ku Klux Klan by 1877 spread terror by keeping Blacks from voting, congregating in certain locations, or even to gain education. One of the most horrible ways to get Negroes to do what the authorities wanted them to do was through lynching. Where hanging someone meant dropping from a scaffold, lynching involved dragging someone into the air by the neck. More than 4,400 were lynched in over 800 counties in the United States, including one in Milwaukee, and two Native Americans further up north. All were "accused" of crimes and never got a trial.

While these numbers are disturbing, what really disturbed me was the attitudes of the "good people." At a museum there were newspapers announcing when a lynching was going to take place. There were authority figures who simply allowed people to be taken from jail to be lynched. There were photos of smiling people standing around a lynched body posing as if they had just killed a trophy deer. Almost all of these crimes went unpunished, even if someone confessed to doing it.

And the people who did it looked like me and you. They did not look evil. They did not wear robes. They did not have torches in their hands. The vast majority of them were good "Christian" people who felt they were doing God's will. That somehow only white people were made in God's image, the rest did not matter. There are groups of people who feel the same way today.

As I stood looking at these photos and reading about what was going on, I truly wondered to myself. Where would my heart have been if I were living in those times? Would I have had enough hatred in my heart to consider another human being's life as worthless? It is very easy to say I would not have treated anyone this badly but the truth is, I do not know. We might say, "it was a different time." We have changed. I am not so sure. People still like to label others so they do not have to consider them to be "real" people. Politicians do it with commercial after commercial. There seems to be no place to hide from someone showing hate for someone else.

"Then God said, "Let us make humans in our image, according to our likeness, and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over the cattle and over all the wild animals of the earth and over every creeping thing that creeps upon the earth." So God created humans in his image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them." Genesis 1:26-27

Why does any of this matter to us modern day followers of Jesus Christ?

George Santayana, Professor of Philosophy at Harvard, said in 1905, "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it."

The **Board of Trustees** met on Thursday, September 8. Following are highlights of that meeting:

- the treasurer's report was reviewed and approved. Mary reported that the shortfall has grown to over \$43,000, the highest it's been at this time in over 10 years.
- the CEC reported that a new Little Lambs VBS coordinator will be needed next year.
- the Personnel Committee reported that Cassandra Richardson has been hired as the new Business Manager. Applications are still being sought for the janitorial position.
- Saturday, October 8, was set as Fall Clean-up Day. All members of the congregation are welcome to help.
- a bid from Brad Schmidt was approved to install permanent wiring and a switch for the heat tape outside the pastor's office.
- several ongoing building maintenance and repair issues were discussed.
- bids are being sought for new gutters/gutter guards for the parsonage.
- the new refrigerator for the parsonage has been delivered.
- the table/chair rental policy has been updated to include that no rentals will be permitted during the months of the Plant Sale and Market Day.
- with the hiring of a new Business Manager, Mary Bade submitted her resignation as Financial Administrator effective September 30, and the resignation was accepted with thanks for her service. She will continue in her volunteer position as Church Treasurer.

The **Board of Elders** September meeting took place after the deadline for this month's Messenger. Highlights of that meeting may be found in the next issue.

The Trustees are pleased to announce that Cassandra "Cassie" Richardson has been hired as our new Business Manager. She will be working up to 20 hours a week.
