Discussions with Dave

As a person who is not comfortable with being in high places, flying does not seem to bother me. The first time both Dina and I ever flew was for our honeymoon in 1985. I have flown many times since. I love the feeling when the plane accelerates down the runway pushing you back into the seat. It's the same feeling I get when I accelerate in my car.

When you are up that far in the air, the landscape below appears flat. There is also a false sense of distance between things like towns, roads, rivers, etc. One can see where roads might have been at one time before a bypass was created.

This trip I spied something I have seen before but seemed to stand out more. It was realizing where railroad tracks once may have been. It is cool to look down and see trains moving along tracks. When you see a very straight line of trees or bushes which cross rivers and roads, making big curves and heading into towns, a lot of the time it is or was a railroad track. I still love to see trains, watch trains, follow trains, etc. It is one thing I have done since 4 or 5 years old when we lived in Madison.

Back when the railroads were the kings of transportation in the United States, companies put down miles and miles of tracks. A town's fortunes could change overnight depending upon where a railroad would lay its tracks. Where we lived in Madison the Milwaukee Road, with its orange and black diesel engines passed by, with the same tracks extended out to DeForest. Here in Lake Mills the Chicago & Northwestern with its yellow and green diesels came through town (I wanted to give Larry Fahney equal time as he worked for the CNW).

A lot of these tracks have been torn out or are no longer in use today. Some, like the former tracks through Lake Mills, have been turned into bike trails. Others become tourist railroads like the one at North Freedom outside of Baraboo. Still others just become overgrown with vegetation and are left to rot. Two places where railroad tracks were laid eventually became roadbed for automobile highways.

Many railroads overbuilt their trackage, which caused problems for them in the long run. They had to keep these tracks maintained for trains to move over them safely. Do you think these railroads thought about this at the time they were building? Probably not. They were probably thinking about future expansion needs. As the future arrived and needs changed, they needed to change what they were doing to keep making the company money.

When Jesus came into the world a few things changed. This change accelerated following his death and resurrection as disciples went out into the world and shared their message of hope and salvation. If you remember your history, many of the people who traveled to the New World did so to worship God in a manner they chose. The Moravians of Herrnhut sent missionaries all over the world to bring the message of God's love through Jesus to people who had never heard about it. I was told (but admit I have not verified) that the Christmas Day tsunami in the Indian Ocean that hit Sumatra washed away gravestones of Moravian missionaries.

The history of the world and the history of Christianity often run together. Sometimes in a good way. Sometimes in a not so good way. On the first day of a class in Medieval History I took in college, the professor's first question was, "Who was the most influential person in history?" Jesus Christ was the answer. Because whether you believe or not, the world changed after him.

Has God's love through Jesus' death and resurrection changed you at all? Does it make a difference in your daily life, or only at Easter and Christmas? Granted, it is not easy anymore to be labeled a Christian. Or Muslim. Or Jewish. It seems the only religious people who make the news these days are extremists from any religious body. And perhaps it makes you uncomfortable to be asked what a difference Christ has made in your life. Christ did that very thing in his time; he made people uncomfortable. He forced a change. Some of the change was welcome. Some was not.

But change the world He did. And left behind the evidence in the landscape of our land and lives.

- more bids have been received to replace gutters on the parsonage.

- a recommendation from the Personnel Committee to hire Christine Kruwell to join the janitorial team was approved.


