### **Discussions with Dave**

### Wishing Won't Help

Another Season of Lent is upon us. Six weeks until Easter Sunday. Lent is a time for growing closer to God through prayer, study, and reflection. We pray for the times we have not lived up to God's expectations, we study the ways God has used people in our world in the past to further His Kingdom, we reflect upon those things we can change in our lives and in our world. Lent used to be the time when people new to Christianity were intensively schooled in the ways of Christ. Six weeks to learn about Christ's teachings. Then they were brought into the Body of Christ. It is difficult to imagine teaching someone so much in so short a time frame. But maybe not having to teach 2,000 years of Christian history, or even 556 years of Moravian Church history would make things a little easier.

We, as members of the Moravian Church love our history. When outside people ask us about the church many are drawn to tell about the history of the church, going back to 1727 in Herrnhut, or even 1415 with Jan Hus. Our history tells us little about what ministry the church is doing today. In the fire service an old description says, "200 years of history unimpeded by progress." The same could be said about the church at times.

The Rev. Dr. Harry Emilius Stocker (1876-1929) writes on page 193 in his 1922 book "A Home Mission History of the Moravian Church in the United States and Canada" about the Lake Mills Congregation:

"At Lake Mills, thirteen miles southwest of Watertown, Brother Kaltenbrunn established a preaching-place soon after he began his labors in Wisconsin. On June 13, 1856, Brother F. John Kilian took charge of the work at that place. On December 21 of the same year he organized a congregation with twenty-three communicants. Soon after a lot was presented to the congregation by Messrs. Atwood and Cook. At that time Lake Mills had about fifteen hundred inhabitants. On October 18, 1857, a yellow-brick church, twenty by thirty-six feet in dimensions, built at the cost of seven hundred dollars, exclusive of the building material, was consecrated. Most of the members of the infant church lived in the county, but within easy reach of the church. Some of the charter-members had formerly belonged to Moravian settlements in Germany."

On page 196 he continues:

"Altho beset by a great many difficulties in the first years of its history, the Lake Mills congregation has flourished greatly for a long time, and now it has the distinction of being not only the largest church in the Moravian northwest, but the third largest in the Northern Province. It has at present one thousand members less two, of which seven hundred and forty are communicants. Much of this remarkable growth took place during the pastorate of Brother Otis E. Reidenbach, who was in charge of the congregation for more than twenty years of the present century."

By the way...the congregation at this time only had one pastor and moved about mostly by horse, and occasionally, a Ford (as all cars were referred to then).

This is our history, or at the very least, part of our history. What does it tell us today? Nothing really. Yes, the congregation has one pastor. Yes, the congregation is beset by a great many difficulties. Yes, we still worship in a part of the building dating back to this time. But really, that is it. No one in our congregation was alive in the early 1920's. Even if there was someone alive, would we wish to minister to people the way they did then? A member of a Moravian congregation in Iowa was removed from membership by the pastor because he had, "joined the Drunken Brethren Society of Brooklyn" (Written in the Brooklyn, IA congregation's Annual Report to the Province in 1908). An older member of Our Savior's congregation in Minnesota told me he remembered when people were expected to leave the church if they got divorced in the 1950's and early 1960's. A denomination used to build a building in a subdivision and all those in the immediate area would attend that church. Very few people within the city blocks that surround our building are members of our congregation.

We lament the changes. We mourn the losses of what made us happy in the past. But the past is not a hero. We cannot look to the past for what our ministry needs to be in the future. During the Spanish Flu outbreak in 1918, churches could not hold services, including Christmas Eve Services. On Easter Sunday in 2020 during the first months of Covid, almost 100 different households tuned into our Easter Service via Zoom. The Pastor Reidenbach couldn't have even dreamed of being able to do that in 1918.

Wishing the past would return will not move our congregation forward. Relying on what worked in the past to bring people to know Christ will not work today. Throughout history the church has changed to meet the needs of those seeking Christ. Our message has not changed. Our purpose has not changed. Our methods must change. If we are unwilling to embrace it for the sake of our mission no amount of wishing will help.

The **Board of Trustees** met on Thursday, January 19. Following are highlights of that meeting:

- the following officers were elected for 2023: Carl Kutzke, President; Steve Brockert, Vice President, and Donna Crossman, Secretary.
- the email vote to purchase a new boiler from Richter Heating was affirmed. The boiler has been installed and inspected.
- treasurer Mary Bade informed the board that we ended 2022 with a shortfall of \$31,956.84. The trustees voted to apply the 2021 surplus of \$8,054.31 toward the shortfall; the shortfall will be discussed at Church Council and at future trustee meetings.
- Scrip proceeds in 2023 will again be designated for Mt. Morris' Building Expansion Program.

The **Board of Trustees** also met on Thursday, February 9. Following are highlights of that meeting:

- the treasurer's report was shared and approved.
- several committee reports were given.
- a facility use request from Boy Scout Troop 148 was approved to allow them to use the Matthew Room for twice-monthly meetings.
- the 2022 shortfall was discussed; Carl Kutzke will speak to the congregation about giving an
  extra contribution toward the shortfall.

The **Board of Elders** meeting took place after the deadline for this issue. Highlights of their meeting may be found in next month's Messenger.

The students are continuing to learn the Beatitudes. The 3-year-olds to 4th grade sang and signed the song "Jesus Loves Me" during the February 12, 2023, worship service and did a fantastic job! On Sunday, March 19, we will be celebrating Pretzel Sunday during our Sunday School time. We will be gathering in Fellowship Hall as a group to make and bake the pretzels. While the pretzels are baking, the children will hear the story of the pretzel and then share fellowship time while enjoying the fresh baked pretzels and juice. Do you know the thoughts on the origin of the pretzel? It has been said the pretzel shape resembles the common prayer position from the early 600's. The first pretzels were baked as a soft, squishy bread, like the soft pretzels of today. Some say they were originally called "bracellae," the Latin term for "little arms," from which Germans later derived the word "bretzel." According to others, the earliest pretzels were dubbed "pretiolas", meaning "little rewards" and were given by the monks as a reward to young children for learning their prayers. These monks supposedly folded strips of bread dough to resemble the crossed arms of praying children. Whatever they may have been called, these twisty treats were a common Lenten food throughout the Middle Ages in Europe and became an all year round snack in its original shape in the 19th century. The three holes in the pretzel are also said to represent the Holy Trinity and seen as a symbol of good luck, prosperity and spiritual fulfillment.

We will not hold Sunday School classes on Sunday, March 26, as that is Spring Break for the public school system. Now, as we have entered into the Lenten season, may peace be with you as we continue our journey to the cross.
